

Between 1880 and 1920, medical knowledge of the genitourinary organs was made 'modern' by innovative surgeons who devised new and safer techniques to cure their patients. However, in addition, the social meanings of masculinity, particularly in Britain, were changing around them. These changes placed greater emphasis on the protection of men's health in line with middle-class values, particularly those concerned with the protection of the nation and the empire via a man's 'character'. This paper traces the relationship between masculinity and genitourinary medicine through the casebooks of the Galwegian surgeon, Peter Freyer.
